A hot housing market and considerable investment has sparked concerns about redevelopment practices and gentrification in Grand Rapids' neighborhoods. Ms. Magaluk will provide an overview of the South Division Corridor Plan process that created a framework for equitable future development in a neighborhood experiencing significant socio-economic disparities. Learn how this new approach to community engagement planted the seeds necessary to lift up existing businesses and residents, create new opportunities for a sustainable mix of housing, businesses and institutions, and improve overall quality of life.

Redeveloping Community Assets: The Lincoln House Project

Redevelopment projects provide the perfect opportunity to increase the supply of affordable and accessible housing. Mr. Deason leads the Shiawassee Regional Chamber of Commerce that was a vital partner in the Lincoln House project, which converted a historic school building (constructed circa 1915) into a 28-unit senior housing facility in Owosso, Michigan. The project is a prime example of how you can create a truly unique and valuable housing opportunity through shared vision and community interaction. Other topics will include preserving historical features, addressing environmental concerns, and generating community investment in the project.

This session will provide an overview of the State framework for marijuana regulation, research on land use impacts of the industry, and outline how Grand Rapids has approached the topic, including being a good neighbor.
